What: In your own words, briefly state the main points of a large amount of information.

- For:**
- Books and movies
 - Chapters
 - Paragraphs

Example: In everyday life, you summarize when you tell a friend about a book you read or movie you watched.

The *Necronomicon* is a book concerning rituals to open other dimensions, often leading to insanity and the escape of strange creatures.

In your own words, condense a small amount of information.

- A single idea
- Sentences
- Word(s)

You paraphrase when you relate a conversation you had with a friend.

Get away! Imma callin' the cops. I ain't playin' now.

(To Paraphrase)
He isn't going to let us in, Frank.



Take the author's exact words and place them in quotations.

- Evidence
- Spot-on phrasing
- Highlight info

Two words:
Copy.
Paste.

He screamed,
"Let me eat your brains!"



***Summarizing, paraphrasing, and quoting must cite the original source. Failure to cite is plagiarism.**
For more information look up quotation formatting, in-text citations, and/or footnotes.

****You do NOT need to cite your own original ideas, common knowledge, or your personal experiences.**
